

WISDOM



While classical schools were once few in number, today approximately 400 private and charter schools serve around 600,000 students with a classical, liberal arts curriculum. It is estimated that about 20 percent of the 2.3 million homeschooled students in the U.S. receive a classical education. More and more parents are opting for this approach when given the choice.

Graduates of Great Hearts Academies not only outperform their peers on standardized tests but also thrive in an educational setting that emphasizes Truth, Goodness, and Beauty. This environment nurtures their development into freer and more virtuous citizens. Great Hearts Academies is thrilled to announce the opening of its newest campus, Great Hearts Harveston, in Baton Rouge. Scheduled to welcome students in grades K-7 in August 2023, the school promises to offer a rich, classical education that cultivates the hearts and minds of young learners.

The announcement was highlighted during a festive community event, "Let it Sneaux," where the Baton Rouge community was transformed into a magical winter wonderland. Great Hearts Harveston, the latest expansion of the Great Hearts network of tuition-free charter schools, participated in the event, spreading holiday cheer and excitement about the new educational opportunities coming to Louisiana.

The event saw over 1,800 attendees, including families and children who enjoyed a variety of holiday-themed activities. Attractions included a stroll down Candy Cane Lane, visits with Santa Claus, and screenings of holiday favorites such as The Polar Express and How the Grinch Stole Christmas. A highlight for many was playing in real snow despite the warm, Louisiana

weather. Sam Heisman, Founding Head of School, noted the joy of watching families engage in snowball fights in 77-degree weather.

Great Hearts Harveston was not just there to celebrate but also to inform. The team provided information about the new school and handed out fun takeaways for interested families. Alicia Carelus, Founding Director of Community Engagement, shared her enthusiasm: "It was so rewarding to talk about the educational opportunities we're bringing to Baton Rouge. Seeing the children's excitement as they learned about the books they'll read and the classes they'll take truly warmed my heart."

Set to open at a newly constructed campus located at 11801 Bluebonnet Blvd in the master-planned community of The Preserve at Harveston, Great Hearts Harveston will initially serve 300+ students. The school plans to expand each year, eventually offering a full K-12 program.

Great Hearts is committed to fostering a learning environment filled with order and joy, guided by a faculty that not only demonstrates expertise in their subjects but also embodies the virtues of character central to the academy's philosophy. The school's curriculum is designed around the pursuit of Truth, Goodness, and Beauty, aiming to inspire students and shape them into the best versions of themselves for lifelong growth.

With the opening of Great Hearts Harveston, families in Baton Rouge can look forward to access to a top-tier educational experience that will help nurture young scholars to achieve their fullest potential.



BRIDGING **CULTURES**

Benjamin Alcott's Immersive Journey through Japan

Great Hearts Northern Oaks junior, Benjamin Alcott, won the 2023 Naoko Mitsui Shirane Foundation scholarship, earning a summer exchange program in Japan. As a student ambassador, Benjamin met notable figures, including a former Chairman of Toyota Motors in Tokyo and the President of the Lexus plant in southern Japan. He also explored cultural landmarks in Kyoto and Hiroshima and spent a week with a host family on Kyushu island, engaging in cultural and diplomatic exchanges.

Reflecting on his trip, Benjamin recalls his initial concern about offending his hosts due to unfamiliarity with Japanese customs. However, open communication helped him integrate smoothly into his host family's life and allowed for meaningful conversations about their cultures. During his stay, he created several lists with his host family's help, covering practical skills like cooking rice the Japanese way, everyday Japanese vocabulary, and cultural differences—such as chopstick use, sliding doors, and the unique role of Japanese mothers, which have remained largely unchanged despite global influences.

Benjamin admired how Japan retains its traditions while embracing progress, a concept reflected in the Japanese word "Kaizen," meaning continuous improvement. He particularly enjoyed three cultural activities: rice planting, a student exchange with Meiko Gakuen Junior and Senior High School, and a factory tour of Oguchi Sake Brewery. Among these, rice planting was his favorite, as it highlighted the deep historical and cultural importance of rice in Japan. At Meiko Gakuen, he enjoyed learning kanji and sharing laughs with his Japanese counterparts. His visit to Oguchi Sake Brewery was equally fascinating, where he learned how Sochu is made.

A key highlight was his visit to Yamahata Shrine, a centuries-old site still actively used by the community. The shrine, home to the oldest reference of Sochu in Japan, represented the cultural and religious differences between Japan and Benjamin's own Judeo-Christian background. It was a "hidden gem" in Isa and an experience far removed from anything he had encountered at home.

Benjamin reflects on his exchange program as an experience he hopes others can have. He expresses heartfelt gratitude to the people of Isa, his hosts, and the program coordinators who made the trip so meaningful.

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

CRAFTING CULTURE THROUGH TEACHERS

HOW GREAT HEARTS CULTIVATES EXCELLENCE IN EDUCATION

What constitutes a good Great Hearts Teacher?

Great Hearts has always held to the standard that "A school is a faculty." While we have an incredible curriculum, what makes it come alive, and what most truly defines our academies is our culture – a culture built by the community of people that make decisions every day about what they value. Who a teacher is – what constitutes their life, what it is they love, and what they believe about teaching, learning, and living – this is what determines the culture of the school and the nature of the education which can happen there. The capacity of a school to offer the right kind of education – one which cultivates both the intellectual and moral virtues – at the end of the day, comes down to the individuals, the teachers.

We frame our first considerations for hiring in the manner we frame many things – by way of Truth, Beauty, and Goodness. In so doing, Great Hearts Headmasters interview and "test" for these considerations, along with assessing candidates' knowledge, and their capacity for effective transfer of that understanding to students.

How do we attract Great Hearts teachers?

Great Hearts Talent deploys extensive resources via a team of national recruiters to build connections and a strong presence with over 100 national target colleges and universities, as well as engaging with local state and private universities to attract strong, missionfit candidates for the growing network. This active engagement combined with traditional methods of recruitment through job postings and strategic marketing have garnered candidates from an incredible variety of backgrounds and experiences who possess an affinity for the Great Hearts mission and a passion for teaching children. Because Great Hearts teachers (in general education) do not require certification, the network may cast a wide net to gather the very best teachers for our scholars – engineers to teach physics and mathematics, historians to teach 4th grade, etc.

GROWTH and Development Pathways

Alongside Professional Development at Great Hearts, the Talent Team promotes and supports the many pathways and development opportunities for academy staff that are distinctive to the Great Hearts philosophy of supporting life-long learning, and personal and professional growth.

Apprentice Teaching Program: Year-long, intensive, fulltime paid program, observing and working directly with experienced mentor teachers in an elementary classroom

Graduate Program Partnership and Tuition Assistance: Great Hearts has developed partnerships with several institutions of higher education that share our commitment to liberal arts education to secure scholarships for our teachers that further reduce the cost of graduate education.

Ad Fiendum and Summer Study Grants: Great Hearts Professional Development publishes a summer catalogue of development opportunities across all subject areas and provides options for staff to apply for summer study grants to subsidize the costs (fees and travel) associated with these programs.

APEX Program for School Leadership: Free to all employees, APEX is a series of short courses designed for developing leaders of classical education. The program provides targeted, continuing education pertaining to school culture, instructional and operational excellence, and a classical philosophy of leadership.

SPED Pathways: Great Hearts encourages current teachers to pursue training for a career in special education, ESL, and more. For participants in our pathway program, Great Hearts pays certification and training costs.

NAVIGATING COLLEGE CHOICES

A Family's Experience at the Great Hearts College Symposium

Over 280 sophomores, juniors, and parents from the Great Hearts Arizona network gathered at Scottsdale Prep for the 15th Annual Great Hearts College Symposium, eager to learn more about upcoming college decisions. The event kicked off with a Personal Statement Workshop before attendees explored classrooms filled with information tables from 59 colleges. Students had the freedom to attend presentations by college representatives, while parents could participate in a Financial Aid Presentation.

The symposium culminated with students returning to the college booths for one-on-one discussions with representatives. "In addition to strong interest in our in-state universities, the University of Oregon, Texas A&M, University of Chicago, Colorado School of Mines, and University of Alabama were among the top schools this year," said Roslyn Fletcher, Director of College Counseling. "We were pleased to see a strong turnout from the class of 2024 and look forward to hosting the event again next year for our Great Hearts high school students."

Great Hearts employee, Jason Moore experienced the symposium for the first time. "Besides writing articles for Great Hearts, I am also a Great Hearts parent. I have four children who attend Great Hearts Academies, with my two oldest daughters in high school—the oldest a junior and the younger a sophomore. Our daughters are in different places in their college journeys: my sophomore is still exploring majors, and my junior is discovering locations and experiences she wants in a college or university.

I attended the College Symposium for the first time this year with my wife and daughters. My girls, adorned in their school uniforms, drew stars next to several schools that sparked their interest on the list they received from their college counselor. 






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
